
Looking ahead to 2024, we are optimistic about the potential of these new policy directions to create beneficial outcomes for all New Zealanders.

Drawing on more than a decade of research, this report acts as a roadmap for the incoming government. It provides practical, evidencebased proposals that cover immediate priority areas such as inflation control, and fundamental fields for reform, including education, health, and housing.

The report contains dozens of detailed recommendations for positive change across 21 policy areas (including fiscal policy, climate, monetary policy, education, health, transport, housing, and local government).

Dr Hartwich emphasises:



The current Governor's "extra-curricular" enthusiasms have heightened concerns about the Bank's focus and capabilities.



Research Note April 2023


This research note offers recommendations on how to improve future pandemic responses.

Professor Gorman states, "New Zealand's pandemic management was marred by political considerations, which compromised the effectiveness and efficiency of our response." He adds, "Transparency and collaboration are crucial in managing crises, but unfortunately, these values took a back seat during the pandemic."



Save our Schools: Solutions for New Zealand's Education Crisis Dr Michael Johnston Research Report April 2023

This manifesto draws on the body of research compiled at The New Zealand Initiative over the past decade to bring together a coherent plan to improve our education system, and to restore it to a place of international pre-eminence.



Paving the Way: Learning from New Zealand's Past to Build a Better Future Dr Matthew Birchall Research Report June 2023

This report reframes New Zealand's infrastructure debate, using history to offer insights and guidance. It highlights key infrastructure success stories, from the laying of toll roads in the Taranaki in the 19th century to the broadband rollout in the 21st century. It also explores a number of cautionary tales to help us avoid past mistakes.



Liquid Gold: New Zealand's need for compensated plasma collections Peter Jaworski Research Note June 2023

Without more donors, the New Zealand Blood Service warns we will rely more heavily on imported plasma products They're right. And Alberta, Canada, shows a better way. Compensating donors results in more donations.

Professor Peter Jaworski is a Georgetown University expert in the economics and ethics of blood and plasma donation. His report on blood plasma donation for the Macdonald-Laurier Institute was co-released by the New Zealand Initiative.




Victoria and Otago Universities employ more non-academic than academic staff

Dr Michael Johnston, Dr James Kierstead and Dr Dennis Wesselbaum Policy Point June 2023

New Zealand's universities face financial crises, leading to significant staff cuts across several institutions, including AUT, Massey, Otago, and Victoria University of Wellington.

Our understanding from a member of Victoria's academic staff was that Vice-Chancellor Nic Smith was working with figures that had academic employees outnumbering non-academics at Vic. We felt it was vital to point out that those figures were inaccurate.



Public Service Bloat: The Evidence Dr Bryce Wilkinson Research Note June 2023

This research note looks at public service performance overall. It is not about public servants as individuals.

Is New Zealand's public service bloated, as many have claimed and others have disputed? What is the yardstick, anyway? How competent is it, and in what respects? Is it focused on serving the elected government and the public interest, impartially? To what extent does it now have an agenda of its own, preoccupied with ethnicity, inequality, diversity, gender and 'the Treaty'?



Funding the Future: The case for special purpose bonds Dr Eric Crampton Research Note July 2023

This research note suggests better tools for infrastructure funding and financing.

Infrastructure funding and financing are a root cause of New Zealand's housing shortage. Better debt funding would let those benefitting from new and renewed infrastructure cover its cost over the long term. And it would give communities more options to come together to support necessary projects.



Blessing or Bloat? Non-academic staffing in New Zealand universities in comparative perspective

Dr James Kierstead and Dr Michael Johnston Research Report August 2023


This is the first report to date on nonacademic employees at New Zealand universities. It presents and analyses a range of data from the Ministry of Education and from universities themselves to build up an accurate and granular picture of the scale and composition of New Zealand universities' administrative staffing.



Pharmac should not be criticised simply for being selective and slow about the medicines it funds

Dr Bryce Wilkinson Policy Point August 2023

Pharmac is often criticised for not funding enough new medicines and for being too slow to determine which ones it will fund. However, being slow and focused is not proof of being too slow or too focused. Evidence from Germany reinforces this point.



Lifeline for Health: Meeting New Zealand's need for General Practitioners Des Gorman and Dr Murray Horn Research Report August 2023

This report advocates for new investment in innovative community healthcare practices, individual budget holdings, and social investment approaches, and it underlines the urgent nature of this crisis, indicating an increasing demand for GPs in the future.



Who Teaches the Teachers? Dr Michael Johnston and Stephanie Martin Research Report September 2023


The report highlights major flaws in teacher education, including an over-emphasis on sociocultural teaching philosophy, insufficient classroom experience, and a near absence of the science of learning.

We recommend allowing for multiple professional bodies for teachers, each with its own professional standards. We further recommend that the effectiveness of teachers registered with each body be regularly measured and published.



The Deficit Diaries: Six years of red Dr Bryce Wilkinson and Dr Oliver Hartwich Research Note September 2023

In this short research note, we focus on the fiscal performance of the Sixth Labour-led Government. We point out that much of our current predicament comes down to unrealistic plans, lack of commitment to stated intentions, and not enough rigour in fiscal management.



A historical perspective on the 2017-2023 Government's spending spree Dr Bryce Wilkinson Research Note October 2023

In this research note, we analyse the six-year spending spree of the Sixth Labour government in the context of historical precedents. Elected on the back of an ambitious policy agenda, the Ardern government quickly found itself struggling to balance the books.




Safe to follow: Faster access to medicines for Kiwis Dr Eric Crampton Research Note November 2023

This research note draws on indicative work by two teams of Canterbury students.

It proposes the Rule of Two. Drugs approved by at least two trustworthy overseas agencies would automatically be approved here. Medsafe could block automatic approval in extraordinary circumstances.

Dr Eric Crampton says: "The Rule of Two would hasten access to safe medicines while imposing little risk."



Class Divides?: The impact of streaming on educational achievement and equality

Dr Michael Johnston and Benjamin Macintyre Research Report November 2023

There have been calls to ban streaming in New Zealand schools. This report explores the evidence on streaming from local and international research. They note that there has never been a systematic study on the effects of streaming in New Zealand.

The authors recommend that, rather than banning streaming, the Ministry of Education should commission a study of its effects in New Zealand schools.



Interim measure required for NCEA Literacy and Numeracy Dr Michael Johnston Policy Point December 2023

The incoming National-led government has prioritised a move towards evidencebased, structured methods of teaching literacy in primary schools. Similar moves for numeracy are also necessary. The incoming government has also promised to rewrite the curriculum, which will assist teachers to sequence learning more effectively.

It will take time, however, for these changes to work through into improvements in the literacy and numeracy skills of senior secondary students. In the meantime, certification of literacy and numeracy should be separated from NCEA.

ENGAGEMENT WITH MEMBERS

We held four members' dinners and lunches and four member-exclusive events which included an international delegation trip. We are proud to have hosted several high-level speakers in 2023. These meetings allowed members to hear from and engage with politicians, industry experts, and international speakers on a wide range of topics.



MEMBER EVENTS

Members' Pre-Budget Lunch with Nicola Willis (April) Wellington & Auckland

We held a Members' lunch at KPMG Wellington on April 18 and KPMG Auckland on April 21 with the Deputy Leader of the National Party, **Nicola Willis**. Nicola spoke to about 60 of our members and discussed what National expects from the Government's 2023 Budget.



Members' Retreat (May) Auckland

Our tenth annual Members' Retreat was held at Park Hyatt in Auckland and attended by around 80 members. At the retreat, members heard from leading figures across the media, academia, and policymakers.

Dr **Oliver Hartwich** gave our members an overview of New Zealand in 2023 and The New Zealand Initiative's thinking on big issues facing the country.

New Zealand's infrastructure deficit is a big topic of conversation, but few people know how good and innovative New Zealand used to be when it came to delivering bigticket times like rails, roads and bridges. The Initiative's historian in residence, Dr **Matthew Birchall**, spoke about some of New Zealand's most iconic infrastructure projects and some lessons that should not be forgotten.

Policymakers need good, reliable and up-to-date data. The Initiative's adjunct fellow Dr **Christoph Schumacher** explained how his project GDP Live can help inform economic policy in New Zealand. In a world first, GDP Live tells us in real-time how the economy is doing and has current estimates of both GDP and inflation figures.

Leader of the NZ National Party **Christopher Luxon** and ACT Party Leader **David Seymour** both led sessions and spoke to members. New Zealand's education system is in crisis. With attendance rates tumbling, international benchmarks slipping and literacy in freefall, our schools need a reboot. Dr **Michael Johnston** and educationalist Professor **Elizabeth Rata** explained what needs to be done to halt the decline and restore New Zealand's education system to world class.

The change of Prime Minister added another twist to the 2023 election year. It raised questions such as how would political camps fare in the campaign? Would we see the reelection of Labour, albeit in coalition with the Greens and The Māori Party? Or would National and ACT, potentially with NZ First, be able to change the Government? Our panellists **Simon Bridges** and **Josie Pagani** discussed the possibilities.

In our members' forum, members representing different industries reflected on the policy issues affecting their businesses. This discussion involved **Malcolm Johns** (Genesis), **Chris Quin** (Foodstuffs) and **Steve Evans** (Fletcher).






























International Delegation to Ireland (June)

In June, we took a delegation to Ireland which was our third international delegation in our history following our visits to Switzerland in 2017 and Denmark in 2019. During our time in Ireland, we explored what makes it one of Europe's most successful economies. This included finding out about the openness of the Irish economy and its ability to attract foreign direct investment.

Over the week, delegates heard from the country's most prominent business leaders, politicans and officials. They learnt about the social and economic policy setting that have made Ireland among the most prosperous countries in the world.

We intented to explore the following issues during the week:

- From a country plagued by poverty and losing its people to immigration to the Celtic Tiger: how did Ireland get rich?
- From an inward-looking economy to a magnet of international capital: How did Ireland become an international economic hub?

 From an economic backwater to a place to do business: How did Ireland strategically set its business and tax policies to become more competitive?

We took our delegates to Dublin, Galway, and to Belfast in Northern Ireland. The itinerary included visits to Trinity College, Iveagh House, Thermo King and Intel.

The group heard perspectives from a range of speakers including prominent Irish politicians, business journalists and business leaders.

The journey to Ireland led to our publication, *Irish Secrets: An Irish Lesson in prosperity.*































NIB Health Innovators' Summit (August) Auckland

The Health Innovators' Summit: Inspiring Action for Better Care was a half-day event that brought together politicians, members of The New Zealand Initiative, professional health associations, and senior journalists to learn about innovative solutions for better healthcare in New Zealand.

Keynote speakers shared their experiences and insights to inspire attendees to take action and improve the current healthcare system.

David Kirk MBE, Co-Founder & Managing Partner, Bailador, led a session about understanding the telehealth market in Australia and how New Zealand could learn from this model and whether this could help deal with cpacity constraints in the New Zealand healthcare system.

Rt Hon Sir **Bill English**, former New Zealand Prime Minister, explored the Manawanui model of individualised funding for disability benefit recipients and its potential impact on the New Zealand healthcare system.

Ian McRae spoke about understanding the healthcare reforms that happened

in Canterbury, New Zealand, after the Canterbury earthquakes and the devolved approach that could be a starting point for the New Zealand healthcare system.

Professor Emeritus **Des Gorman**, University of Auckland discussed the latest research on increasing the number of General Practitioners and better workforce planning in the New Zealand healthcare system.

Tom Irvine and Rangimarie Hunia, Ngāti Whātua Ōrakei, explored the potential for partnerships between iwi (Maori organisations) and private health providers to improve healthcare outcomes in New Zealand.

Finally, Dr **Oliver Hartwich** led a panel discussion between all six keynote speakers.















The author, Professor **Des Gorman** discusses his report with Dr **Oliver Hartwich** and what can be improved in future pandemic planning.

Webinar: Save our Schools (April)

This webinar launched our research report Save Our Schools: Solutions for New Zealand's Education Crisis.

The webinar and our publication, came at a critical moment, with New Zealand facing the choice between reform and decline in our education system.

The report's author, Senior Fellow Dr **Michael** Johnston, led a thought-provoking discussion with literacy expert Professor James Chapman, writing pedagogy specialist Dr Helen Walls, and the innovative Principal of Manurewa Intermediate School, Iain Taylor.



Webinar: Post-Budget Briefing (May)

Budget 2023 came at a critical time for New Zealand. Inflation showed no signs of abating. The current account deficit stood at a record high. Many commentators forecasted a severe recession down the track.

Dr **Oliver Hartwich**, Dr **Eric Crampton**, Taxpayers' Union Executive Director **Jordan Williams** and Taxpayers' Union Chair **Laurence Kubiak** discussed the economic implications of the Government's fiscal plans.

Artificial intelligence and the future of education (June) Auckland & Wellington

This forum provided an opportunity to discuss and debate the implications of generative AI for education. We explored opportunities that AI offers and potential policy initiatives to make the most of those opportunities. We also explored the risks and ways to mitigate them. The discussion informed a forthcoming report from the New Zealand Initiative on the topic.

Webinar: Learning from New Zealand's past to build a better future (June)

We held a webinar in June to launch *Paving* the Way: Learning from New Zealand's Past to build a Better Future.

Everyone talks about New Zealand's infrastructure deficit. But few people know how successful we once were at delivering big-ticket items like roads, rails and bridges. The report's author and our historian in residence, Dr **Matthew Birchall**, analysed some of New Zealand's most iconic infrastructure projects. His insights offer a unique perspective on how we can navigate the challenges that lie ahead.

Matthew discussed his findings on the webinar with our Executive Director Dr **Oliver Hartwich** and **Nick Leggett**, Chief Executive of Infrastructure New Zealand.



Webinar: Admin overload in New Zealand universities? (August)

In August, we launched our report Blessing or Bloat? Non-academic staffing in New Zealand universities in comparative perspective.

The report's author Dr **James Kierstead** was joined on this webinar by Dr **Oliver Hartwich**, and Massey University Distinguished Professor **Gaven Martin** to dive into the level and nature of administrative staffing at our universities. They discussed the implications for the future of higher education in New Zealand.



Who teaches the teachers? (September) Auckland

In September, we launched our report Who Teaches the Teachers? Reforming initial teacher education at Auckland Grammar School.

Dr John Etty, Associate Principal of Auckland Grammar School, joined authors Dr Michael Johnston and Stephanie Martin to discuss ways schools can contribute to developing new and more effective ways of preparing teachers for the classroom. Attendees were invited to discuss ways to improve teacher education in New Zealand.

In this report, Michael and Stephanie look at New Zealand's university-dominated model of teacher education. They conclude that student teachers don't have enough practical classroom experience and that there is not enough rigorous assessment of practical teaching skills.

They also demonstrate the overabundance of theory in university teacher education programmes, which undermines the effectiveness of instruction.

The report highlights that better-prepared teachers will lead to improved student outcomes and that investing in teacher education is a key strategy for improving educational equity and social mobility.



ACHIEVEMENTS

The New Zealand Initiative exists to provide and promote sound public policy. Here are some of the areas where we succeeded in influencing policy:

Coalition agreements

The time after the election was marked by change as the new government began to take shape. The New Zealand Initiative engaged with this opportunity for change, providing thoughtful analysis and promoting policies that benefit all New Zealanders.

A key aspect of the new government's approach, aligning closely with our principles, is its commitment to enhancing the policymaking process. The coalition agreements had an emphasis of using rigorous cost-benefit analysis and grounding decisions in empirical evidence.

This was a welcome development. It promised more effective and efficient policy to address long-standing issues such as economic growth and regulatory reform.

Throughout the agreements, there were unmistakeable signs that the New Zealand Initiative's research and advocacy had borne real results.

The Government stated that it would reform market studies introduced by the Commerce Amendment Act 2018 to focus on reducing regulatory barriers to new entrants to drive competition. We have been active in market studies process for grocery retail and building materials, and we have been urging the Commission to focus on barriers to entry.

In its agreements, the Government would consider setting an income threshold above which a personal grievance could not be pursued. Our work has recommended this change, which will make it easier for businesses to dismiss underperforming managerial staff, benefitting both companies and their workers.

They also planned to narrow the Reserve Bank's Remit, removing the dual mandate and focusing on price stability. The Initiative has long argued that the Reserve Bank should return to a single inflation mandate. Price stability should be, and now will be, the bank's only concern.


They would also aim to amend the Overseas Investment Act 2005 to limit ministerial decision making to national security concerns and make such decision making more timely. The Initiative has prominently noted the benefits of foreign investment, advocating that only rare national security concerns be screened.

Health

In the healthcare sector, the government's promise to adopt the 'Rule of Two' for faster access to safe medicines should result in a significant breakthrough.

Under the Initiative's proposed Rule of Two, drugs would automatically be approved in New Zealand if they had been approved by at least two trustworthy overseas approval agencies, unless Medsafe had extraordinary concerns about a particular medicine. But drugs so-approved would be reviewed if withdrawn from foreign markets.

This policy, long-advocated by the Initiative, will ensure timely approval of new pharmaceuticals, streamlining Medsafe's process, aligning it with international standards. It is an example of a responsive, evidence-based policy that will directly benefit the well-being of New Zealanders.



Education

Perhaps most importantly, the government's education focus resonates with our research and advocacy. Initiatives like strengthening core skills such as numeracy and literacy and revising the curriculum are crucial for improving education outcomes and preparing future generations for success. In December 2023, our Senior Fellow Dr Michael Johnston was appointed chair of a newly formed Ministerial Advisory Group.

Minister of Education Hon Erica Stanford announced that the group would review the curricula and teaching methods to provide teachers with the clarity and tools needed to teach these core subjects effectively. Dr Johnston will lead a world-class team, including literacy expert Emeritus Professor James Chapman, mathematician Distinguished Professor Gaven Martin and curriculum design expert Professor Elizabeth Rata. Work will be done in the first half of 2024, ready for implementation in 2025.
